

RECYCLING POINTS

The issue of the re-siting of the recycling bins was raised by George Marshall (Donside Community Council) at the recent LCA AGM. A view was offered that the village and surrounding area should have been consulted before moving the bins.

The new set of five bins - now in the **correct** position - is on a trial basis and is in addition to the existing bins, to be assessed over two months. This is at the suggestion of Aberdeenshire Council.

Up to April this year LCA, as a registered charity, paid reduced trade waste rates.

As of April 2015, the council's Trade Waste service that is offered to charities is changing and LCA were made aware

of this by letter in March. There are two choices:

1) Change from Trade to a Domestic Service and incur no annual charge. Like all households in the area the Hall would be entitled to one General Waste bin and one Co-mingled recycle bin and a food caddy. The glass bins would be removed and **ALL** users of the hall would be required to take their recycling home or to recycle the glass at the community recycle point.

The LCA would be responsible for any waste or recycling left by users and have to pay the appropriate fee to get any waste or recycling collected.

2) The alternative would be to keep the glass bins and pay full commercial Trade Waste rates for all waste, including the General and Co-mingle bins. This will run to £352.27 (for 2015-16) a year which will have to be found from LCA funds.

During our discussions with the Council Waste Team about the recent frustrations surrounding non-collection of the hall waste/recycling, the council proposed that they would be happy for the community recycling points to be re-sited outside the hall.

The Hall Committee is in favour not only because it solves the problem of glass recycling and potentially saves the village hundreds of pounds a year in Trade Waste fees but also because the new site is tidier and close to other village amenities.

With reference to consulting the village, the Council has followed its consultation procedures in this case; they do not carry out individual household consultation for a re-siting of recycling bins but have contacted local councillors and Community Councils to ask their views.

Because the new site is on a trial basis there are a couple of months for further consultation before a final decision is taken.
